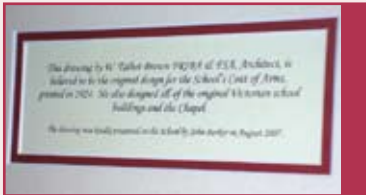
Letter from the Chairman of the Governors The School Crest

This year's President Elect is former Headmaster Graham Garrett. Graham was educated at Alley's School and Gonville & Caius College, Cambridge where he was a Maths scholar. After serving in the RN as an Instructor and working in industry, he joined the staff at Radley College in 1961. He moved to Shrewsbury School in 1964 as Head of Maths before becoming a housemaster in 1967. In 1973 he moved to Wellingborough and began his term as Headmaster, which was to last 20 years.

Graham has said, "The fifteen years since retiring from Wellingborough have passed rapidly, I have continued with former interests and started new ones such as Bird Watching and Botanising with others in the University of the Third Age, which is very active in Cambridge. Part-time work on the House Staff of the National Youth Orchestra from 1993 – 2000 was a wonderful experience with great concerts in the U.K. and abroad. We keep in touch with education by visiting careers departments in schools and meeting pupils from years 11 and 12. I have also managed to pass a couple of piano exams, sing in a local choir, and took a year's course to qualify as a tourist guide in Cambridge. My grandchildren are at school age now and we see them regularly. One is having golf lessons so I keep in touch with the game in that way as well as playing occasionally."

Letter from the President

Summer 2008 will mark 20 years since I left the School and I am immensely honoured to have been invited to be your OW President, let alone the first Lady President for the OW

Club in its 110-year history, for this year. I recall the first OW Dinner I attended in November 1988 at the Masonic Hall in Rushden where I was greeted enthusiastically by Peter Lock (54-65, Pa), and then led into a room of gentlemen with a very sparse sprinkling of ladies – very much a reminder of my early days as a day pupil at Wellingborough in the 4th Form Junior school where my classes consisted of approximately 30 boys and 3 girls! It was at this dinner that I was introduced to, and sat with members of the OW Rifle Club - a club that I continue to try to support, albeit very occasionally in later years.

Since being invited to be President Elect at the AGM in November 2006 (and subsequently President from November 2007), I have enjoyed attending several school events – not least the Senior School Prize Giving Day in June 2007 on behalf of my predecessor, Richard Barwick (53-57, Pl), where Jo Salter, the first female fighter pilot, spoke about the ups and downs of finding herself breaking into a male environment and the situations that were hurriedly re-thought to accommodate her (for example, the design of the flying suits for long distance travel and comfort!) In October, I was invited to the School's production of "Anything Goes" at the Castle Theatre, Wellingborough before the show was taken to America – yet another successful drama exchange with Quince Orchard High School (USA). Both these events brought home to me the wealth of talent (academic and in the Arts) we have coming through the school, which, as most OWs are aware, has undertaken numerous changes since we left.

In November, the OW club welcomed me as President with my first duty being the following morning at the Remembrance Service in the School Chapel to read a lesson. In December, I attended the School Carol Service, where the Chaplain used a slide show as a visual aid to his address – yet another welcome change to my school days.

Unfortunately I have not been able to attend all occasions as I would have wished, and I am grateful to Richard Barwick for attending the memorial service for Grp Capt. J B Tait at St Clements Danes, The Strand, London on my behalf.

On 14th March 2008, 126 gathered at the Churchill Museum and Cabinet War Rooms for the annual London Dinner. I hope that everyone who attended thoroughly enjoyed the evening, and had time to explore and reminisce. For me, seeing contemporaries whom I hadn't seen for 20 years and to see first hand the experiences in Afghanistan of Major Giles Timms MC (82-88, Pl) will not be forgotten. Thank you Giles. I must also thank Tony Abell (52-57, Fr) Edward Minchinton (99-04, G), Peter Phillips (54-65, Pa), Jerry Higgins (57-66, St) and Debbie Whittemore for their invaluable assistance with the coach and arrangements in making this a successful event.

In early April I joined the OW Golf Society at the Halford Hewitt competition in Kent. Thank you to Michael Port (61-72, Cr) for his invaluable guidance on the game of Golf and showing me some of the prestigious golf courses in the UK. I am also indebted to all the members there for looking after me so well – it's a shame I was not able to bring you more luck against Forest (lost 4-1). Again here I was able to catch up with old acquaintances – Chris Billson (71-81, C), Tim Poole (77-86, Pa) and Justin Chacksfield (84-91, G) to name a few. OBITUARIES

We offer our sincere condolences to the families and friends of all whose deaths are reported below:

Wing Cdr Eric Barwell (23-29, G), who has died aged 94, had a distinguished career as a fighter pilot, seeing action during the evacuation from Dunkirk and in the Battle of Britain; later he became a successful night fighter pilot.

Eric Gordon Barwell was born at Clare, in Suffolk, on August 6 1913 and was educated at Wellingborough School before joining the family engineering firm. In July 1938 he joined the RAFVR to train as a pilot at Cambridge. At the outbreak of the war he was called up and completed his training when he was commissioned. Barwell joined No 264 Squadron in February 1940. Having destroyed six enemy aircraft during the spring and summer of 1940, Barwell was awarded a DFC.

He flew many night patrols in support of the Allied landings in Normandy, and on June 24 he intercepted another Junkers 88, which was trying to attack shipping off the mouth of the Seine. He stalked the enemy aircraft for 30 minutes before finally shooting it down. Two weeks later, he was awarded a Bar to his DFC. Barwell's final success in the air came on August 10 when he shot down a V-1 flying bomb as it approached the coast of Kent. In addition to his two DFCs he was also mentioned in dispatches and received the Air Efficiency Award.

After the war he returned to Barwell Engineering, the family firm near Cambridge, which specialised in tyre retreading.

Eric Barwell died on December 12. His wife died in 2002 and a son, Philip (named in memory of his elder brother who also attended the School. PR Barwell was another decorated flier, but was killed during World War Two), and two daughters survive him. (Source: The Daily Telegraph)

Gerald de Lucie Carver (31-35) was born on 8th January 1922. He was at the School from September 1931 until December 1935. During the Second World War he was awarded the D.S.O. and D.F.C., as well as being Mentioned in Despatches. He died 29th January 2008 after 4 painful years of illness borne with quiet courage. (Source: The Daily Telegraph)



James Perkins BSc (39 to 48 P) died in October 2007 aged 77. He was Head of House and a School Prefect, representing the 1st XI Cricket and 1st XV Rugby teams, the latter with First Colours,

and was a 1st Class Shot, while he represented Parkers in all disciplines, frequently as Captain, including tennis, athletics and even basket-ball. He continued his piano skills to become A.L.C.M. Leaving School Jim read chemistry at Leeds University, following which he did national service in the Army at Eaton Hall, Chester, where he was commissioned, and later Corsham. He then joined the family business of tanneries based in Irthlingborough, Northampton and Kettering, where he latterly became Managing Director, and in 1959 married Patricia, a current Governor of the School. After nearly forty years in the leather industry, following 'semi' retirement, he co-founded a recruitment consultancy, subsequently selling to a national company, which now triggered full retirement. With great respect and fondness for the School he was a keen supporter of numerous events,

and even in his final months when his long illness had severely weakened him physically, he was attending various choral and other functions at the School. He leaves Patricia and his three children Paul, Marcus and Camilla, all of whom are OWs, and six grandchildren.

Dr William 'Bill' Arthur died on March 3rd 2006 at the age of 92 (Medical Officer 1954-1980). Born in 1913, Bill was the eldest child of **Dr James Arthur (Medical Officer 1906-1954)**. He attended Wellingborough Junior School (1922-1927) before going on to Fettes College in Edinburgh. He followed in his father's footsteps studying medicine, firstly at Jesus College, Cambridge and then at the Middlesex Hospital in London where he qualified in 1940. Bill joined the RAFVR at the outbreak of war in 1939. In 1941 he married Rosalie, daughter of Air Marshal Sir Victor Richardson (at that time the man responsible for organising and improving the RAF's medical resources and capabilities). After a spell with Bomber Command in the UK, he was posted in 1943 to India where his squadron supported the 14th Army's push into Burma. He returned to the UK in 1946 with the rank of Squadron Leader. Deciding to pursue general practice rather than specialise, he took on the daunting challenge of working alongside his father, a demanding and uncompromising man who set the highest standards of medical practice. Bill shared his father's values and loyalties and in 1954 took over the responsibilities of School Medical Officer. He always felt a part of the School and was very proud of the family practice's longstanding association that was to last for 74 years – only finishing when he retired in 1980. Despite many protestations and a keenness to continue work, Bill retired from the practice in 1980. His senior partner said of him – "We all enjoyed working with him. He was of the old school of GPs - an excellent listener and he very seldom, if ever, got flustered. He was secure in his judgements and patients felt safe in his hands". Letters from his patients echo this sentiment - "As a doctor you struck the right balance and I am sure that you would not be insulted if I called you the people's doctor". "I believe that the reason that you were liked so much was because you treated people as people and not just as bodies". He led an active and full retirement and Bill's other great passion was hunting. He was master of the Pipewell Foot Beagles from 1952 until 1985. The ideal antidote to the stresses of general practice, his hunting kept him fit and healthy well into his seventies and early eighties.

Robert Hart (40-50, Pa) died on 21st July 2007 aged 74. On leaving school he joined the family business in Rushden. In retirement he used his time to further his many interests. He became accomplished in creating things and his hobbies included go-karting and cars together with building and flying model aircraft and gliders - the latter he designed and built himself representing Great Britain in international events. Other hobbies included the countryside (he was an accomplished watercolour artist) and he also enjoyed

archery. He was also credited with building his own swimming pool at his home in Hargrave and as a qualified silversmith took pride in the construction of jewellery. Another of his great interests was the game of golf and he took an active part in golfing society events. He leaves a widow, Brenda, and a son James.

William Heward Garland (41-44, Fr), 'Bill', BDS, LDS, DDPH; former President of the Community Dental Group of the British Dental Association died December 13th 2007. He was always known to his fellow cricketers at school as 'Willie' and I think that he and his younger brother, John, (J.E.) must have arrived at Wellingborough about 1940 as a result of being evacuated from the London area. I have not kept in touch over the years although I knew that he had trained, after leaving school in 1942 (?), to become a dentist. His fellow cricketers of the 1st XI of '41 and '42 will remember him as a very effective fast bowler of the wind milling, all-action and moving parts variety. I'm fairly sure that in 1942 Parker's House won the Senior Cricket Cup for the first time and I'm sure that Willie would have played a large part in that. One other cricketing story that I would like to recall again, if only to confirm whether Willie Garland played a part if it, is the trip that the 1st XI made in 1941 (?) to Forest School in Essex, to play their 1st XI. Wellingborough skittled Forest out for 13 runs - yes, thirteen, knocked off the runs and then played a rather tame second innings match before returning home with a rather unbelievable story.
